HON. SECRETARY'S REPOR

Presented at the Annual General Meeting of the Members

on Thursday, the 9th January, 1908.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

In presenting my Report for 1907, I think I may safely say that the Club is in as sound and healthy a condition as at any period of it's existence.

Our membership list is about stationary. Since January last, we have had eleven new members, but the resignations already to hand, with other names to be removed from the books, will nearly, if not quite leave the Active list as at the beginning of the year.

I greatly regret to have to record the decease of one of our Honorary members, Mr. Hubert Park, which took place in the early part of the year. Mr. Park was well known to most of us, and took a keen interest in the doings of the Club.

As last year, I must repeat that the attendance at Club runs and fixtures is not what it ought to be. The average, 26:61, is only '34 above 1906, none too good when we consider that in 1902 it was nearly 29. The first 50 Miles Unpaced Handicap on April 27th claims the largest muster, 42, whilst low-water mark, 17, is equally divided between the All-Night ride on June 22nd, Nantwich, September 7th, and Cronton, November 30th. A new record is created in that four members have attained the distinction of not having missed a fixture, and as two of the members are first-year men, we have good reason to congratulate ourselves and them.

There is a tic for first and second attendance prizes between Messrs. W. P. Cook and R. A. Fulton, with 53 each.

I think this record will show that the gentlemen you elected twelve months ago have been fully alive to the importance of their duties.

After an absence of two years a return was made at Easter to Bettws-v-Coed, and the Holiday Tour proved perfect in every respect; ideal weather, a proper riding programme, and the Commissariat department presided over by a real Chef. Twenty-seven members and two friends participated. The Good Friday excursion, to the Devil's Kitchen, per bicycle and foot, was carried out by eight men, the real riding programme commencing on the following day. The route taken on Saturday was via Capel Curig and Pen-y-Gwryd to Beddgelert, then continuing on to Carnarvon. This latter part was entirely new to the majority. The roads were somewhat loose, and punctures frequent, but the riding was easy. From Carnaryon the Llanberis Pass was stormed, the view from the top being greatly admired. Thence it was a slide back to Bettws. Sunday saw all carrying out the scheduled ride to Llanwrst and Conway for the Sychnant Pass, a fine ride back down the Trefriw side of the river completing an excellent day. On Monday most of the party returned by Pentre and Denbigh, the ride over the Sportsman being very fine, and the road in much better condition than the main Corwen road. Thence on to Hinderton for tea, and a quict ride in the cool of the evening brought to a close one of the finest Easters the Club has ever experienced, and certainly the best Easter Tour the Club has ever carried out in Wild Wales.

Friday evening, June 21st, was the date fixed for the All-Night Ride to Abergavenny. The whole ride was notable for the good fortune in missing the heavy rain that fell at different times during the week-end, and although the wind at times was troublesome the event was most enjoyable, and worthy of much better support. The ride to Whitchurch. where the first halt was called for refreshment was uneventful. the night being fairly light and the wind not so trying as it proved later in the day. Shrewsbury was reached inside scheduled time, and at Craven Arms full justice was done to the excellent breakfast provided, thirteen being the number then present. Ludlow, Leominster, the climb up Dinmore. the fine run down, and soon Hereford was reached. From here to Abergavenuy proved the most grafty part of the whole journey, the wind being dead ahead and much stronger. The afternoon was spent in viewing the town and Castle grounds. At dinner we mustered 18, several having had to make the journey to Hereford by train. An early breakfast was the order for Sunday morning, and by 9 o'clock all who were returning home were ready for the road. In small detachments by 1-15, nine had arrived at Craven Arms for lunch. Tyre troubles had been the order of the morning, and with usual perverseness the wind had backed from S.W. to N.W. Most of the party once again met at Chester, and partook of tea at the Talbot before finally breaking up.

The August Tour took us into the West Riding of Yorkshire and although on all three days some very stiff climbing was experienced the outing was most enjoyable. Whalley was the meeting place for tea on Saturday, the night being spent at Skipton, where sleeping accommodation was provided for at three different hotels. Next day leaving Skipton by the Sandy Beck Pass the route lay through Rilston, Cracoe to Freshfield, and into Wharfedale; here the scenery was truly beautiful. Buckden, the venue for lunch, is a quaint little place consisting of about ten houses and one hotel. The return to Skinton was by way of Kettlewell and down the East side of the river through Coniston to Grassington, Proceeding by Burnsall we recrossed the Wharfe and went through Appletreewick to Barden Bridge. We had afternoon tea at Barden Tower, an exceedingly beautiful place, and continued the ride on by Bolton Bridge back to Skipton. Leaving Skipton on Monday morning we started the return journey with a long climb to Gargrave, thence on to Hellifield and Long Preston, and across Upper Ribbesdale to Wigglesworth. The road from here to Slaidburn is very hilly indeed, and even beyond to Whitewell it was not all level going. At Whitewell we had lunch, and then continued quietly on through Longridge to Preston where the tour virtually ended, the Liverpool section proceeding on to Rufford for tea. That the Tour was a great success there is no doubt, and for the rough state of the roads it was really marvellous how free from tyre troubles we were.

We have held three week-end runs in the past season, all in the latter part of the year.

The first in connection with the September "50" was spent at Shawbury, and attracted a muster of twenty-four. Socially it was a great success although the sleeping accommodation was somewhat pre-historic. On October 19th we earried out the Annual Autumnal Tour in North Wales staying the Saturday night at the Hand Hotel, Llangollen. The weather was most unsettled with a gale of wind, and considerable rain, but in spite of this twenty-eight members and two friends altogether participated. For lunch on Sunday fifteen reached Ruthin, via the Horseshoe and the Nant-y-Garth, four more via Corwen, three more out from Liverpool, and so we numbered twenty-two there. This trip might be described as a really excellent week-end under none too favourable conditions.

The general expression of opinion being for a week-end in November it was decided to again try the experiment on the 16th and 17th of that month. Congleton may not be the best place as the sleeping accommodation is so limited, although it provides an opportunity for a ride in East Cheshire too little explored by most of us. We numbered thirteeu, no wonder it rained. Touring was the order for Sunday, six going via Gawsworth, Redesmere to Knutsford for lunch, Chester for tea, then Hinderton and home, the other half proceeding direct to Nantwich and Hinderton.

In turning to the racing programme of the past year we have good reason to congratulate ourselves on a few points. Firstly, the very fine riding of several new men who appeared in competition for the first time, I refer more especially to Messrs. G. E. Carpenter, R. A. Fulton, A. P. James and J. J. Rogers. Secondly, the all round merit of the performances in the 12 hours' handicap, and thirdly the magnificent record rides of Mr. E. J. Cody, his unpaced "50" and Liverpool-Edinburgh with Mr. R. L. L. Knipe.

We opened with a "50," on the Seven Sisters Course, on April 27th. The weather was about as bad as it could be, cold enough for January. The first prize was won by Mr. A. P. James (12mins.) who did a splendid ride of 2hrs. 57min. 3lsecs.: this was his first attempt in competition and he seemed to fairly revel in the vile conditions. Mr. E. J. Cody, second and fastest, 2hrs. 49min. 35secs showed us again the sterling stuff he is made of. Mr. J. J. Rogers was third with 2hrs. 55min. 19secs. Then followed Mr. H. G. Bailey, 3hrs. 10min. 47secs., Mr. R. A. Fulton, 3hrs. 10min. 22secs., Mr. J. C. Band, 3hrs. 3min. 36secs., Mr. H. Dakin, 3hrs. 16min. 2lsecs., and Mr. H. Pritchard, 3hrs. 14min. 37secs.

Whit Monday and the Anfield Invitation "100" will probably be linked together for many years to come. This years race was again a huge success, the weather being most favourable, and the entry again a record. 59 names appeared on the card, 44 starting and 29 finishing. Punctures, etc., were responsible for the retirement of such good men as Messrs. C. E. Smith (Manchester Wheelers), D. V. Peiser (North Road Club), R. A. Wingrave (North Road Club), F. Bowie (Unity C.C.), W. Jones (Manchester Wednesday), E. M. Dawson (North Road Club), F. Wasley (Bath Road Club) and E. Bright, E. A. Bentley, R. A. Fulton, A. P. James, and H. Pritchard of "ours." Fastest time, the coveted distinction, was again accomplished by Mr. F. H. Wingrave, scratch, who rode magnificently, and finished in the remarkable time of 5lirs. 17min. 44secs. This is the third time Mr. Wingrave has made fastest time in this event, and he now holds record for the course. Mr. F. C. Lowcock (Manchester Wheelers) (20mins.) easily secured first place with the very fine performance of 5hrs. 20min. 50secs, and he caused Mr. Wingrave many auxious moments in the latter stages of the race. Mr. E. J. Wyatt (Manchester Clarion (50mins.) was second with 5hrs. 57min. 51secs. and Mr. J. Hodges (Manchester Wednesday) (22min.) 5hrs. 32min 45secs, was third. Others who finished were J. A. Grimshaw (Cheadle Hulme) (35mins.) 5hrs. 45min. 59secs. J. P. Taylor (Manchester Wheelers) (16min.) 5hrs. 28min. 48secs. J. J. Rogers, ("Ours") (22mins.) 5hrs. 39min. 39secs. H. H. Agnew, (Vegetarian C.C.) (15mins.) 5hrs. 34min. 12secs. F. T. Hawkes, (Polytechnic) (15mins.) 5hrs. 34min. 27secs. W. Nolan (Birkenhead North End) (35mins.) 5hrs. 54min 51secs. F. H. Oakley (North London) (25mins.) 5hrs. 45min. 43secs. W. H. Kettle (" Ours ") (32mins.) 5hrs. 55min. 48secs. C. B. Elmhirst (Yorkshire Road Club) (45mins.) 6hrs 9min. 21secs. P. P. Wheaton (North London) (25mins.) 5hrs. 50min. 3secs. C. F. G. Boyes (Midland C. & A. C) (35mins.) 6hrs. 0min. 13secs. C. Hilhouse (North Road Club) (10mins.) 5hrs. 35min. 56secs. E. J. The experiment of holding the June "50" in Shropshire may be written down a great success, for although it was raining in Liverpool, it was quite fine in Shropshire. Roads were excellent, but a strong wind from the south-west severely hurt and was particularly bad for the tricycles. Of the eighteen entries fifteen started and twelve finished, Mr. J. E. Green going wrong, Mr. H. Dakin retiring, and Mr. D. C. Kinghorn puncturing. It was early seen that Mr. E. J. Cody (scratch) was riding at the top of his form and notwithstanding puncturing at 47 miles and finishing on the rim he secured first and fastest with the magnificent time of 2hrs. 31min. 25secs. Mr. H. Pritchard (10mins.) was comfortably second with 2hrs. 45min. 19secs. and Mr. R. A. Fulton (8mins.) who rode full of "beans" throughout, was third with 2hrs. 44min. 39secs. Mr. H. Poole (20mins.) on a tricycle did wonderfully well for the day, getting within 7 minutes of record with 2hrs. 57min, 23secs, which placed him fourth. Other finishers were Mr. E. A. Bentley (14mins.) 2hrs. 51min. 35secs. Mr. C. H. Turnor (12mins.) 2hrs. 51min. 52secs. Mr. A. P. James (6mins.) 2hrs. 46min. 7secs. Mr. W. H. Kettle (7mins.) 2hrs. 48min. 47secs, Mr. H. G. Bailey (15mins.) 2hrs. 56min. 53secs. Mr. J. J. Rogers (scratch) 2hrs. 45min. 59secs. Mr. A. Crowcroft (9mins.) 3hrs. 2min. 39secs. and Mr. E. Bright, tricycle, (20min.) 3hrs. 16min. 15secs.

On July 13th nine competitors were dispatched in the 12 hours handicap, all except Mr. W. H. Kettle, who punctured, riding through. Again we were favoured with the weather, and managed to secure some wonderful performances, quite up to the best traditions of the past. The handicap was won by Mr. A. P. James (22 miles) with 1821 miles. Mr. C. H. Turnor (18 miles) was second with 183 miles and Mr. R. A. Fulton (16 miles) third with 1834 miles. Mr. E. A. Bentley (22 miles) did 1763 miles. Mr. G. E. Carpenter (30 miles) 166 miles. Mr. H. Pritchard (18 miles) 1773 miles. Mr. J. J. Rogers (4 miles) 1891 miles and Mr. E. J. Cody (scratch) 1915 miles. Mr. Cody rode strongly throughout and finished within 21 miles of Northern record. I might point out that Messrs. James, Fulton, Carpenter and Rogers were all novices at this distance, and the splendid figures totalled are greatly enhanced by this fact.

Five out of the seven entrants for the 24 hours ride faced the starter on Friday night, August 23rd. First competitor away was Mr. Woodroffe followed at five minutes intervals by Messrs. G. E. Carpenter, A. P. James, H. Pritchard,, and J. J. Rogers. On the return from Acton, Mr. C. H. Woodroffe, owing to a fall some time previous, retired. thus leaving only four to fight it out. Mr. James had tvre trouble on the Chester-Gayton stretch, losing a lot of time in consequence. Nothing further happened until Mr. Pritchard, who had seemed to be a trifle too fast early on, did not complete the course, qualifying for a standard medal however with 260% miles. Mr. Rogers ran into first place with 3253 miles, thus getting within 11 miles of Northern record. Mr. James obtained second place with 318? and no doubt would have caused the winner considerable trouble in the latter stages but for repeated tyre trouble. Mr. Carpenter was third with 314 miles, proving to us without doubt that he is a stayer of no mean ability. All these performances are first attempts at this distance, and are therefore very fine. Thirty-four Anfielders have now done over 300 miles in 24 hours.

The last event of the season, an unpaced "50," was held in Shropshire on September 21st. In many respects it was most

successful, and I think we may conclude that all the "50's" in future might be held on this course. The weather was perfect, but the roads very puncturesome, with the result that Messrs. Green and Tierney were early put out of the running, while Mr. James had distinctly hard lines in finding trouble at 43 miles when going strong. The scratch man, Mr. Cody, was unfortunately unable to get down in time to compete. Mr. Pritchard (11mins.) secured a well-deserved win by showing an improvement of 34 minutes doing 2hrs. 41min. 43secs. Mr. Rogers (5min.) was second and fastest, with 2hrs. 35min. 51secs, an improvement of 10 minutes on his previous best. and Mr. Fulton (9mins.) third, with 2hrs. 44min. 31sees., practically repeating his June effort. Other finishers were Mr. Carpenter (16mins.) 2hrs. 51min. 38secs; Mr. Band (5mins.) 2hrs. 41min. 31secs; Mr. Turnor (15mins.) 2hrs. 52min. 52secs.: Mr. Foster (20mins.) 2hrs. 58min. 14secs: and Mr. Crowcroft (18mins.) 3hrs. 5min. 58secs.

On July 6th Mr. E. J. Cody made a successful attempt on the Northern "50" single bicycle record on the Shropshire course. The weather at the time of starting could hardly be called fine, for there was a fair breeze, frequent drizzly showers, and the outlook was far from promising. Shawbury corner 26[‡] miles was done in 1hr. 16[‡]mins. and the record seemed safe barring accidents. We have never seen Mr. Cody riding so strongly before. It was not long before he was again seen dropping down from Edgebolton and Mr. Poole, the timekeeper, announced 2hrs. 27min. 19secs. Our very best thanks are due to Mr. Cody for bringing this record back to the Club. We have not held it since 1903.

Mr. E. Bright rode under Anfield Colours in the "Bath Road Hundred," on August 5th and did 5hrs. 28min, 10secs. He was fourth on the handicap.

The Edinburgh-Liverpool tandem record having been disturbed by a foreign crew it was again attacked by an Anfield pair on September 7th. I am sure all in the Club were delighted to see Mr. Knipe emerge from his retirement, and, with Mr. Cody, ride as only he could a few years ago. The time-sheet made ont was none too soft, but in spite of this Kendal was reached 30 minutes ahead of time. Shap proved very trying on account of the heat, but at Carlisle the halfhour gained earlier was still in hand. The last twenty miles were done in less than an hour and eventually Edinburgh was reached the ride clocking 13brs. 23mins. a splendid performance, hall-marked by the R.R.A.

Owing to Mr. Cody's fine performance in the 12 Hours Handicap which showed he had the unpaced record at his mercy, an attack thereon was scheduled for August 8th. However a fierce south-west gale was blowing, and, after battling valiantly against the wind for 120 miles, he decided to abandon the attempt.

On August 30th Messrs, C. H. Turnor and N. H. Higham made an attempt on the R.R.A. and N.R.B.A. 12 and 24 hours tandem record. The weather conditions and roads were perfect. For some reason they seemed to steadily lose time on their schedule, and were a long way behind at Chester, where they finally decided to give up.

The Albrighton "100" Time Trial for some reason has not been a success. Only two notices were given for attempts and both these were abandoned, one "drowned out," the other finding tyre trouble. It is hard to understand why the trip did not take on. We have plenty of energetic young riders who, one would think, could have done a very decent performance.

Until a few months ago we seemed as far off as ever from solving the great difficulty in the open "100." Now we welcome Mr. W. M. Bailey as an Active Member, and things seem to be pointing another way. Given good luck, anything may happen.

Pride of place in the prize-list is held by Mr. E. J. Cody, who has during the past year ridden most consistently and with the absence of that bad luck which dogged him for many seasons. His 12 hours, 2nd "50," "50" record, and Liverpool-Edinburgh Record with Mr. Knipe, stamp him as a scratch man and one at the top of the tree.

Mr. J. J. Rogers comes next. The merit, (as a novice) of his 12, 24 hours, and last "50" speak for themselves. Given time for training we all feel sure he would develop into a very great rider. Mr. A. P. James, another novice, has astonished us by his pluck and endurance. His first race, the April "50," was a most disheartening experience, and where many another rider would have given up, he stuck to his task and had the gratification of doing a splendid performance. In the 12 and 24 hours he was again at his best and we look to him for something startling in the future.

Mr. Pritchard reaps the reward of good training. His two "50's" and 12 hours were quite up to the standard of anything he has done in the past.

In Messrs. J. C. Band, R. A. Fulton, G. E. Carpenter, E. A. Bentley, and C. H. Turnor we have a quintette to rely on for future good work, while Mr. H. Poole has, on his tricycle, again shown us what can be done on a three-wheeler.

Mr. R. L. L. Knipe gave us a glimpse of his past fine form in the Liverpool-Edinburgh record ride, and we hope to see him resume active speed work during the coming year.

I should like to thank all those members and friends who have undertaken to perform the important and thankless task of checking, and would particularise the following gentlemen: -Messrs. W. R. Toft, G. B. Mercer, E. G. Worth, E. Edwards, W. P. Cook, G. A. Evanson, A. McCall, A. Marshall Higham, N. M. Higham, R. L. L. Knipe, J. Lowenthal, E. H. Fox, F. H. Koenen, F. H. Wood and any others I may have inadvertently forgotten. In this respect I would call on every member to assist the secretary whenever the occasion arises. All who are not racing should make a point of being out somewhere and do what they can to help. A very little help goes a very long way, especially in a matter of this kind.

As most of you are aware I bring my term of office to a close to-night, and I can only ask that you will give to my successor that generous and spontaneous assistance I have always received, and which has made my two years as Secretary so pleasant.

Messrs. J. C. Band, E. A. Bentley, C. Blackburn, H. M. Buck, S. Buck, E. J. Cody, C. J. Conway, T. B. Conway, W. P. Cook, E. Edwards, G. A. Evanson, D. R. Fell, R. A. Fulton, F. Gee, A. M. Higham, N. M. Higham, G. Jackson, A. P. James, C. Keizer, D. C. Kinghorn, R. L. L. Knipe, A. McCall, G. B. Mercer, L. Oppenheimer, W. M. Owen, J. Park, G. Poole, H. Poole, R. E. Prichard, H. Pritchard, J. J. Rogers, D. C. Rowatt, R. T. Rudd, J. H. Sunter, G. J. Theakstone, J. R. Wells, J. H. Williams, E. G. Worth, and the Hon. Secretary.

Mr. G. J. Theakstone moved, and Mr. J. Park seconded, and it was resolved-

"That the Minutes of the last Annual General Meeting be taken as read, and that they be confirmed."

Mr. T. B. Conway moved, and Mr. G. B. Mercer seconded and it was resolven-

"That the report of the Hon. Secretary be adopted."

Mr. H. Poole moved, and Mr. H. M. Buck seconded, and it was RESOLVED-

"That the accounts for the year ending December 31st, 1907, be adopted."

Mr. W. M. Owen moved, and Mr. C. J. Conway seconded and it was RESOLVED--

"That the Annual Subscription for Active Members during the year 1908 shall be One Guinea, with an Entrance Fee of Five Shillings, and the Annual Subscription for Honorary Members a minimum of Ten Shillings, and that the Prize Fund be continued."

Mr. W. P. Cook moved, and Mr. T. B. Conway seconded and it was RESOLVED that Bule 21 be amended as follows--

"Any Member violating the Rules or Regulations of the "Club, or being discovered not to be, or ceasing to be an "Amateur, or acting in a manner derogatory to the interests "of the Club, may be expelled by the votes of a two-thirds "majority of the Members present, and voting, at a Special "General Meeting summoned for the purpose, and such Mem-"ber shall receive six days" notice of such Meeting. Any "Member so expelled shall forfeit all claim upon the property "of the Club, and shall cease to be a Member. Voting to be "by ballot."

Mr. C. Keizer and Mr. J. H. Sunter having been appointed Scrutineers, Mr. E. Edwards proposed, and it was carried with acclamation "That Mr. G. B. Mercer be elected President."

Mr. W. R. Toft, proposed by Mr. G. B. Mercer and seconded by Mr. J. Park and Mr. E. G. Worth, proposed by Mr. H. W. Keizer, and seconded by Mr. H. Pritchard were unanimously elected Vice-Presidents.

Mr. H. Poole, proposed by Mr. E. J. Cody, and seconded by Mr. E. A. Bentley, was unanimously re-elected Captain.

Mr. E. J. Cody, proposed by Mr. H. Poole, and seconded by Mr. G. J. Theakstone, and Mr. N. M. Higham, proposed by Mr. G. J. Theakstone, and seconded by Mr. T. B. Conway, were re-elected Sub-Captains.

Mr. W. M. Owen, proposed by Mr. W. P. Cook, and seconded by Mr. H. Poole, was unanimously re-elected Hou. TreasurerMr. G. B. Mercer proposed from the Chair, and it was carried unanimously, that Mr. A. P. James be elected Hon. Secretary.

It was proposed by ballot that the following gentlemen be elected Members of the Committee.—Messre, J. C. Band, E. A. Bentley, T. B. Conway, E. Edwards, R. A. Fulton, A. M. Higham, H. W. Keizer, and H. Pritchard.

Mr. E. Edwards proposed, and Mr. T. B. Conway seconded, and it was carried, that Messrs. D. R. Fell and J. Lowenthal be elected to audit the Accounts of the Club for the year ending 31st December, 1908.

Mr. H. Poole proposed, and Mr. N. M. Higham seconded, and it was RESOLVED-

"That the Club's Racing Programme consist of two or three 50 miles Unpaced Handicaps at the discretion of the Committee, 100 Miles Invitation Unpaced Handicap, and the 24 Hours' Unpaced Road Ride."

Mr. W. P. Cook proposed, and Mr. H. Poole seconded and it was **BESOLVED**—

"That an Entrance Fee of 10/6 be charged all entrants for the 24 Hours' Road Ride to cover feeding expenses."

Mr. H. Poole proposed, and Mr. A. M. Higham seconded, that a sealed handicap for 12 Hours be run, if possible, in connection with the 24 Hours' Ride at the discretion of the Committee, details re following, to be left in the hands of the Committee.

Mr. H. Poole proposed, and Mr. W. P. Cook seconded, that the Albrighton 100 Miles Time Trial be left as last year.

Mr. H. Poole proposed, and Mr. W. P. Cook seconded, and it was **RESOLVED**-

"That a special Prize, value Five Guineas, in lieu of the usual Gold Medal will be awarded to any first claim member who succeeds in beating any of the Unpaced Place to Place Records recognised by the Road Records Association, and not held by a member or members of the Anfield Bicycle Club. Tandem riders to divide the Prize, as per Rule 8."

Mr. W. P. Cook proposed, and Mr. H. Pritchard seconded, and it was RESOLVED-

"That no invitations for the 100 be sent to any Club participating in the Liverpool Roads Championship for 'Express' shield, and that the Committee be instructed to communicate with such Clubs as were invited last year and afterwards competed in the 'Express' races, stating that as Sunday time trials in Wirral under the aegis of a newspaper were not in accord with the best interests of the sport, we have decided not to issue invitations to any club participating therein this year. and would like to know whether they intend to again do so."

Mr. E. G. Worth proposed, and Mr. E. A. Bentley seconded. and it was **RESOLVED**--

"That a special prize be awarded to the member doing fastest novice time during the year in any of the 50 mile handicaps. No rider will be eligible for this prize who has previously won any prize or standard medal in any cycle race."

Mr. C. J. Conway proposed, and Mr. F. Gee seconded, and it was resolved-

"That the Club Tour at Easter be to Bettws-y-Coed."

Mr. E. A. Bentley proposed, and Mr. C. Blackburn seconded, and it was RESOLVED-

"That the June All-Night Ride be to Oxford, and the August Bank Holiday Tour be in Derbyshire."

Mr. W. P. Cook reported that Mr. F. Del Strother offered another special prize, and it was unanimously decided that it be awarded to the first placed Anfielder in the 100 Miles Invitation Handicap, prize winners barred.

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Del Strother for his continued generosity.

It having been voted urgent as required by Rule 12, Mr. W. P. Cook moved, and Mr. R. E. Prichard seconded, a proposition to amend Rule 23 to read as follows:—"A General Meeting of the Members or the Committee may, for services rendered the Club," etc. But after some discussion the motion was defeated.

The meeting closed with hearty votes of thanks to the Chairman, Hon. Treasurer, Auditors, Scrutineers and Hon. Secretary.

. RULES. .

1.-This Club shall be called the "ANFIELD BICYCLE CLUB."

2.—This Club shall consist of Cyclists who are considered eligible for membership under Rule 20.

3.—No Active Member of this Club shall be permitted to join or retain active membership in any other LOCAL Cycling Club. This Bule not to apply to Clubs in which existing Anfielders have held membership prior to 30th June, 1891.

Officers.

4.—The Officers of the Club shall consist of President, two Vice-Presidents, Captain, two Sub-Captains, Honorary Secretary or Secretaries and Treasurer, all being Active Members.

Committee.

5.—The Committee shall consist of sixteen Members including the Officers.

Auditors.

6:-Two Auditors from amongst the Members, none of the Committee being eligible, shall be appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting, to examine, and report upon, the Accounts and Balance Sheet.

Meetings.

7.—The Annual General Meeting shall be held within the first two weeks of January, to receive the Hon. Secretaries' reports and Treasurer's Balance-Sheet; to appoint officers and Committee for the ensuing twelve months; and to transact any other business that may be found necessary.

8.—A General Meeting of the Club shall take place whenever the Committee or Secretary convenes the same. Thirteen to form a quorum. 9.—It shall be the duty of the Committee or Secretary to convene a General Meeting when requested to do so, in writing, by ten or more Members of the Club, and they shall call such meeting within two weeks after receiving such requisition. If the Committee or Secretary fails to call such meeting, then the requisitionists shall be ontitled to call it.

10.—Six days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given by the Hon. Secretary, who shall at the same time circulate amongst the Members an Agenda paper of the matters to be brought forward.

11.—Any member wishing to bring forward any matters should send particulars to the Hon. Secretary, who shall cause the same to be entered on the Agenda of the next General Meeting.

12.—Business which does not appear on the Agenda paper shall not be brought forward until all the subjects on the Agenda have been disposed of, nor shall such business then be discussed unless it be voted URGENT by two-thirds of the Members present.

13.—Any proposition appearing on the Agenda paper in the name of an absent member shall be deemed equal to, and treated as, a proposition made "in propria persona" by the said Member, and shall be moved by the Hon. Secretary.

14.—Every Amendment and every proposition which does not appear on the Agenda paper shall be written and signed by its proposer and seconder, on a form which shall be provided by the Hon. Secretary.

15.—No resolution of any previous General Meeting shall be rescinded unless the Member proposing to cancel such resolution shall have given notice on the Agenda paper of his intention to do so.

16.--No alteration of the Rules of the Club shall be made except at a General Meeting, and then only by a two-thirds majority of the Members present and voting.

17.—ALL Active members residing at a distance of not less than fiftcen miles from Liverpool may exercise the right of Proxy Voting upon any subject appearing on the Agenda of any General Meeting, or which the Chairman may rule to be coincident thereto. 18.--Ine Minutes of all Meetings shall be open for inspection to any member of the Club on giving reasonable notice to the Hon. Secretary.

19.--Committee Meetings shall take place each month, preferably during the second week. Seven to form a quorum.

Active Membership.

20.—Candidates for Membership must fill up a form provided by the Club, which must also be signed by the proposer and seconder (both having been Active Members of the Club for at least six months), and forward the same to the Secretary. Each candidate's name, together with the names of his proposer and seconder, must be formally posted at the four Buns next ensuing after the candidate's nomination has been received, after which the nomination shall come up for consideration at the next Committee Meeting. If any objections are received, the Committee shall consider them on their merits. two negative votes to exclude; but if the nomination be still insisted on by the proposers, a Special General Meeting shall be called to consider the candidature, ten black balls to exclude.

21.—Any Member violating the rules or regulations of the Club, or being discovered not to be, or ceasing to be an amateur. or acting in a manner derogatory to the interests of the Club, may be expelled by the votes of a two-thirds majority of the Members present, and voting, at a Special General Meeting summoned for the purpose, and such Member shall receive six days' notice of such Meeting. Any Member so expelled shall forfeit all claim upon the property of the Club, and shall cease to be a Member. Voting to be by ballot.

Life Membership.

22.—A General Meeting of the Members may, for eminent services rendered the Club, elect to Life Membership any Member of 15 years standing; such Life Member shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of Active Membership.

Honorary Membership.

23.-Candidates for Honorary Membership shall be proposed and seconded by Active Members, and shall, unless objected to. be elected by the Committee at their next meeting; but should any objection be made, it shall be dealt with under Rule 20. A General Meeting of the Members may, for service rendered the Club, place upon the Honorary Membership List the name of any Member of three years standing who shall be leaving the country. Such name to remain there during the term of his residence abroad, free from any Annual Subscription. Such a Member may on his return resume Active Membership upon his notifying the Secretary of his intention so to do, without undergoing the formality of re-election.

24.—Honorary Members shall not receive the regular notices of Club runs, etc., neither shall they be permitted to attend or vote at any General Meetings, nor to take part in more than three Club Runs during the year, nor compete for any of its long-distance prizes, or in any of its closed events.

25.—An Honorary Member may become an Active Member upon payment of the difference between his honorary subscription and the current subscription and Entrance Fee of the Club; but his name must come before the Committee in the usual way.

Subscriptions, &c.

26.—The MINIMUM Annual Subscription for Honorary Members shall be 10/-, no entrance fee being charged to them. The Annual Subscription for Active Members shall be one Guinea, payable within one month from date of election, with an Entrance Fee of 5/-. Any Member whose Renewal Subscription is not paid by 1st March shall receive written application from the Treasurer, and if payment be not made within one month from the date of such notice, the Treasurer shall bring the matter before the Committee, that body having full power to deal with the case as it thinks fit. After the 31st August in each year, the subscription to incoming Members shall be onehalf the ordinary Annual Subscription, but the full Entrance Fee shall be chargeable under all circumstances.

Resignations, &c.

27.—Any Officer or Member of the Committee wishing to resign his office or seat on the Committee, shall notify the same (in writing) to the Hon. Secretary, for the information of the Committee, but nntil such resignation shall have been accepted. he shall continue to exercise the duties and retain the responsibilities of his office.

28.—Any Active Member wishing to resign must give notice (in writing) to the Hon. Secretary, before the Annual General Meeting; otherwise he will be held accountable for the ensuing year's subscription.

Finance.

29.—The funds of the Club shall be banked in the name of the Anfield Bicycle Club, the President and Treasurer for the time being shall jointly sign cheques to meet current expenditure, as authorised by the Committee. All accounts to be passed by the Committee and initialled by the Chairman before payment.

30.—The Financial Year of 'he Club shall expire on the 31st December in each year.

Club Colours.

31,—That the Club Colours shall be Blue and Black. The Badge shall be a Silver Button enamelled with the Club Colours; Record Holders' Badges are distinguished by a Beaded Edge. The Badge to be the property of the Club and to be returned, if called for, upon the expiration of membership to the Hon. Sec., who will allow for same. The Captain shall wear a Gold Monogram Cap Badge.

Committee.

32.—All runs shall be arranged by the Committee, and shall not be altered without its consent.

33.—The Committee shall have power to fill up any vacancy in the Officers or Committee which shall occur within the year, subject to confirmation by the next General Meeting.

34.—The Committee may decide any question on the meaning of these Rules, or anything relative to the Club not provided for therein, and may do whatever they deem necessary for the well-being of the Club, which is not inconsistent with these Rules. The decision of the Committee shall be final, unless notice of appeal, in writing, be given to the Hon. Secretary within seven days following that on which the decision is arrived at. All such appeals shall be heard at the next General Meeting, and the decision of such Meeting shall, in every case, be final.

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"No claim for record will be passed unless the time or distance is befor than the existing unpaced record,

No. 8.—All tandem prizes will be divided, half to each man, and both riders must be active Members of the Anfield B. C. and comply with Prize Rule No. 1.

No. 9.—If a Record Medal is awarded, no Standard Medal can be claimed for the same ride. No 100 miles Standard Medals will be given in any 12 or 24 Hours Race or Ride. No Standard Medals can be claimed for any distance in Place to Place Record rides. Gold Medal from Club Die shall only be awarded for Records, Fastest Times, First Prizes, and Standards in 12, and 24 hours, from Standard E and upwards.

No. 10.—Members winning Medals may substitute Prizes of equal value, subject to the approval of the Committee as to the form these may take.

No. 11.-Claims for Medals, accompanied by proofs, must be sent in to the Hon. Secretary within 7 days after the performance of each ride.

No. 12.-No distance ridden in any of the Competitions will be recognised if it be done either wholly or partially on a Sunday.

No. 13.-NO PIECE OF ROAD MAY, UPON ANY PRETEXT, BE COVERED MORE THAN TWICE, or if covered, shall not be counted in the total distance claimed.

No. 14.—Motor pacing or following is entirely barred. In attempts for Standard Medals, followers are not allowed to approach the rider within 300 yards.

No. 15.—All Prizes and Medals will be awarded at the discretion of the Committee, who shall have full power to decide any question which may arise as to the interpretation or application of the rules.

Races.

Members are requested to consider the information contained herein as "Private and Confidential."

It is intended to hold during the season, not exceeding three Unpaced Fifty Miles Road Handicaps for single machines, over courses to be selected by the Committee. Four prizes will be offered, viz.:-First, Second, Third and Gold Medal for the fastest time.

Time Medals will be awarded as under, Prize Winners barred :

In order to win any of these time medals the rider must improve on his previous best time.

One special prize is offered to the member doing fastest novice time, during the year. in the above 50 miles handicaps. No rider will be eligible for this prize who has previously won any prize, or standard medal, in any cycle race.

On Whit Monday the Unpaced Hundred Miles Invitation Road Handicap will be hold as usual, over a course to be selected by the Committee. Prizes, value Five Guineas, Three Guineas, and Two Guineas, will be offered, and also a Gold Medal for fastest time in the Race.

The 24 Hours' Unpaced Road Ride for single machines will be held over a course to be selected by the Committee when three prizes will be offered. An Entrance Fee of 10/6 will be charged each entrant to assist in covering feeding and other expenses.

A Special Prize, value £3 3/-, will be given for the best performance during 1908 in 100 Miles Unpaced Trial, over the course from Chester to Albrighton and back.

The above three events will also give members opportunities of competing for the Unpaced Standards as per lists.

In all cases the Committee reserve the right to decline any entry and to cancel any fixture.

Prizes will be withheld if, in the opinion of the Committee, the performances done are not sufficiently meritorious.

Special Prizes.

Special Prize, presented by Mr. F. Del Strother, will be awarded to the best placed Member in the 100 Miles Invitation Handicap. Prize Winners barred.

Prizes will be presented to the 1st and 2nd members attending the greatest number of fixtures (Officers and Committee barred).

Members claims for Club runs, by any other than those attending Club tea, must be passed by the Committee.
