HON. GEN. SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Presented at the Annual General Meeting of the Members, 10th January, 1925.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

It is my pleasant duty to present to you a report of the Club activities, other than racing, for 1924. Although I have to report a very small decrease in the membership and in the attendances at the fixtures, I feel we can lay claim to another successful year of Club runs and tours, particularly in the tours.

Early in the year, your Committee decided it necessary to call a Special General Meeting—the third to be held within the course of a few years. It is to be hoped that a meeting for a similar purpose will never have to be held again. By the result of that meeting, I feel sure that we are now free of that small section who had not the best interests of the Club at heart.

Passing on to the statistics, which are interesting, it is a healthy sign that the membership continues prosperous. We have now 203 members, a decrease of 2 since a year ago, composed of 156 Active, 18 Junior Active, and 29 Honorary. There have been elected 9 new members, 3 Active, 5 Junior Active, and 1 Honorary, many fewer than in 1923, which was to be expected following on the resolution of the last Annual General Meeting. Six resignations were accepted and three names struck off.

I deeply regret to have the unpleasant task of recording the deaths of two members. To a club of our age, deaths of old members have regretfully to be expected from time to time. Last year Mr. J. Butler passed away in his 71st year. Although personally unknown to myself, 1

understand that in his earlier years he took an active interest in the Club affairs, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. Early in the year no less than 8 members were unfortunately implicated in accidents with motor vehicles, happily not seriously, which was followed by the death of Mr. R. P. Seed while on his way to help at a Club "50." Healthy, and in the prime of manhood, his sudden death came as a great blow to us all. During the early years of his Club life he was one of the most active of the younger members. His bright and jovial manner will not be forgotten by the many with whom he came in contact.

Once more it is pleasing to record the excellent attendances at the Club fixtures. Fifty-three runs have been held with average attendance of 46.415, which, although a decrease of 1.528 below 1923, is very good considering the poor climatic conditions which attended a large proportion of the fixtures. The averages for the individual quarters were: January-March, 44.077; April-June, 51.231; July-September, 43.615; and October-December, 46.714.

No less than six members have attended all the runs; they are Messrs. W. P. Cook, W. E. L. Cooper, W. H. Kettle, W. Orrell, C. Randall and H. Austin. Messrs. Cooper, Orrell, and Randall share the attendance prizes, officers and committee being debarred from these awards. Twenty members have been present at over 40 fixtures, the best totals besides those already mentioned, falling to H. Green, J. E. Raylinson, and C. H. Turnor, with 51 each.

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As usual, the largest attendance was at the "100," where 102 members helped to make things go smoothly. Curiously, Tarporley again fell the lowest, where on two occasions, once in March and once in September, both fine days, we mustered 29—but 29 cannot be considered low. On 20 occasions the number present exceeded 50.

The 12 Committee Meetings which have been held have been very well attended, which shows that the officials you selected twelve months ago have, on the whole, taken a keen interest in their duties. Early in the year they considered it essential to curtail the racing expenditure, which decision has, I think you will agree, since proved justified.

The monthly Circular which helps so much to keep us in touch with our members "abroad," has continued to go very well, and we have to thank Mr. A. T. Simpson for his good work as Editor.

On the suggestion of one of the members, it was decided to institute a fie of the Club colours, which would be suitable for wear at business. I am assured that these ties are selling very well. I ask you to bear them in mind.

I shall now touch on the Club Tours, which have been so very well supported, and so successful.

The tour to Bettws-y-Coed, at Easter, attracted 51 members and 7 friends. Throughout the whole holiday the weather was glorious and the number at the day runs greatly exceeded expectations. At lunch at Rhyd-y-fen there were 15, at Menai Bridge 39, at Portmadoc 40, while at Denbigh on the homeward run there were 23.

Whitsuntide again saw us in Shropshire, and considering the weather was so unsettled, the big muster of 102 can be counted as splendid.

Previous to last August it is many years since the Club undertook a tour in Ireland. With peace once more in the Emerald Isle, it was arranged to have a tour over August Bank Holiday Week-end. Under the guidance of Mr. T. W. Murphy, Editor of the "Irish Cyclist," the party of 19 enjoyed immensely the beautiful scenery of Co. Wicklow.

The Autumnal Tints Tour to Llangolien attracted the good number of 28. The weather was very unsettled. Lunch on the Sunday, at Ruthin was well attended.

The last tour of the year was held at Christmas, with headquarters at Bettws-y-Coed, and was supported by 15, who carried out some enjoyable day rides among the Welsh passes.

After the very successful All-Night Ride of 1923, your Committee again decided to carry out last year's ride, commencing on a Saturday afternoon. The chosen destination was Aberystwyth, and 18 took part. The inclement weather during the night, attended by a few tyre punctures, necessitated all but a few "cutting" the ride. However, the beautiful day that followed amply made amends for the discomfort suffered during the night.

In conclusion, I refer you to the final paragraph of my report of two years ago, wherein I appealed for better support of the Club fixtures by the younger members. There are still far too few who figure high in the attendance list, and I trust that 1925 will see a substantial increase.

HON. RACING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting to you my Report of our Racing activities for 1924. The programme as arranged at the last General Meeting has been successfully carried out. Entries may not have been so numerous as last year, but there has been an all round improvement in the racing generally. The first "50" attracted an entry of 15, the second 19, the third only 13, and the fourth 20. For the Invitation "24," we had 25 entries, but as only four clubs accepted our invitation, it was not as representative as we should have wished. The 12 Hours suffered a lapse in popularity, only 21 entering, as against 32 last year.

The first "50" was held on May 3rd. A little rain fell before the start, but cleared off before the first man got away, but left the roads rather wet. Of the 15 entrants, 14 started and 11 finished. With the exception of G. F. Hawkes, the times were not up to expectations, Hawkes with 13 minutes, improved upon his previous best by over 8 minutes, and was easily First with the fine ride of 2hrs. 40 mins. 7 secs., F. L. Edwards was Second in 2 hrs. 34 mins. 34 secs., and G. B. Orrell Third and Fastest in 2 hrs. 34 mins. 21 secs.

The second "50" was held on May 24th, on a day when conditions were favourable for fast times. It is pleasing to record an all round improvement in the performances, at least three beating "evens" and the rest well inside three hours. There were 19 entrants, of whom 15 started and 13 finished. J. S. Blackburn, who made a welcome return to speed work, was First in 2 hrs. 26 mins. 58 secs., G. B. Orrell was Second and Fastest in 2 hrs. 26 mins. 35 secs., and F. L. Edwards Third in 2 hrs. 28 mins. 27 secs.

The next event to record was the Invitation "100," held on Whit Monday, June 7th. This event still maintains its popularity, probably largely due to it being the only open "100" in the North. But I consider if it is still to maintain its reputation as a "classic," invitations might be extended to clubs who have not hitherto been represented

and whom we know to possess first-class riders and anxious to compete, while something should be done to restrict the entries of the mediocre riders, whom appear to get more numerous each year. Now for the race itself, of the 100 entrants, 99 started and 64 finished. The weather conditions were very similar to last year with an unfavourable wind from Hodnet to the Finish. A. Wilson (Scratch), Yorkshire R.C., was fastest from the start, and at 914 miles was inside "evens" and record for the course, but the punishing finish told its tale, and he ran out time with the fine ride of 5 hrs, 3 mins, 4 sees., this being the second year in succession he has accomplished Fastest time in this event. Another ride of almost equal merit was that of E. C. Filcher (4 mins.), Polytechnic, who, a complete stranger to the course, was Second Fastest in 5 hrs. 7 mins. 39 secs. First place in the Handicap went to A. Gunn (27 mins.), Liverpool Century, with the ride of 5 hrs. 23 mins. 58 secs., E. Sutton (28 mins), Manchester Grosvenor Whirs, with 5 hrs. 26 mins. 44 secs., and Third to J. S. Blackburn (20 mins.), " Ours." with 5 hrs. 19 mins, 16 secs. The Team Prize again went to the M.C. & A.C. with an aggregate of 16 hrs. 1 min. 17 secs., and the Second Team Medals to the Polytechnic with an aggregate of 16 hrs. 19 mins, 42 secs. In addition to the fine ride of Blackburn's, mention must also be made of G. B. Orrell's (18 mins.), whose 5 hrs. 23 mins, 37 secs. placed him 8th in order of Handicap.

For the Invitation "24," we returned to July for the running of this event, which with the Finish carried out in daylight made it much easier to control. On the whole, the weather was favourable, with the exception of several rainstorms during the night, and most of the extensions out of Chester were done on wet roads. Early on Shaw quickly assumed the lead with W. A. Tuplin (Gomersal Road Club) and A. Hancock (Manchester Grosvenor Wheelers) close up. At 12 hours their distances were, Shaw 196 miles, Tuplin 190 miles and Hancock 186 miles, this order was maintained to the Finish, Shaw running out time with a total of 363½ miles, which placed him First, while Tuplin was Second with a total of 359½ miles and Hancock Third with

a total of 352½ miles, "Ours" to finish were C. Randall 343½ miles, W. Orrell 338½ miles and N. Turvey 321½ miles; there are now 61 Anfielders who have ridden over 300 miles in the day.

The 12 Hours Club Handicap was held on August the 16th, this, which we look upon as our most popular event, was disappointing, attracting only 21 entries, of whom only 9 finished. This may have been partly due to the weather conditions, as there were several hours' rain and a thunderstorm in the afternoon. Notwithstanding the adverse conditions, three riders covered over 190 miles, all of which were excellent for the day. A. E. Morton, with an allowance of 20 miles, made a mess of the Handicap and was easily First with 193\(^a\) miles, G. F. Hawkes (10 miles) was Second and Greatest Distance with 199\(^a\) miles, and H. Austin (14 miles) Third with 190\(^a\) miles.

The third "50" was held on September 6th, and attracted only 13 entries, of whom 9 started and all finished. Blackburn, who had not been well since the 12 hours, was not showing his usual form, this left H. Austin and G. F. Hawkes to make a fine race of it for Fastest, but at 38 miles Austin had the misfortune to puncture, Hawkes (7 mins.) eventually finishing First and Fastest in 2 hrs. 31 mins. 1 sec. Another excellent performance was that of G. H. Welfare (20 mins.), who, notwithstanding a puncture, only missed First place by 28 secs., and finished Second in 2 hrs. 44 mins. 20 secs., while F. Perkins was Third in 2 hrs. 39 mins, 2 secs.

The concluding event of our Racing Programme was the fourth "50," on September 20th. In view of the small support accorded to the previous "50," the Committee seriously considered the advisability of running this event, but fortunately it turned out a great success, as results showed. There were 20 entries, of whom 17 started and 13 finished. It commenced to rain soon after the start and continued throughout the race, which, with a strong South-West wind, made it a particularly hard day. R. F. Gilmour (13 mins.) with an improvement of exactly 9 minutes

upon his previous best performance, was First in 2 hrs. 40 mins. 20 sees., while A. Lusty (10 mins.) was Second in 2 hrs. 37 mins. 59 sees., this being his best ride at this distance in any of our races, and G. B. Orrell (Scratch) was Third and Fastest in 2 hrs. 28 mins. 12 sees., and which, considering the day, is undoubtedly his best "50."

Turning to the Open events in which we have been represented, I am pleased to report we have met with more success this year. With the improved form shown by G. B. Orrell, J. S. Blackburn, F. L. Edwards, G. F. Hawkes and others, we are now in the picture for Fastest Times and the Team Prizes. In the Manchester Wheelers "50" on June 21st, we were well represented. Unfortunately, owing to a severe cold, G. B. Orrell was forced to stand down and punctures spoiled the chances of the rest. J. S. Blackburn punctured and rode 234 miles on a low geared machine and did well to do 2 hrs. 37 mins. 20 secs., and F. L. Edwards did 2 hrs. 38 mins. 37 sees. On August Bank Holiday we had riders in three events, namely, the East Liverpool Wheelers "50" and the Bath Road and Speedwell "100's." In the first mentioned we have at last secured a Fastest Time award in an Open event, and our congratulations go to G. B. Orrell for his splendid ride of 2 hrs. 26 mins. 17 sees., and to F. L. Edwards, who was just outside "evens" in 2 hrs. 30 mins. 33 secs., G. F. Hawkes and S. T. Threlfall did 2 hrs. 35 mins. 28 secs, and 2 hrs. 46 mins, 2 secs. respectively. In the Bath Road "100" we were ably represented by J. S. Blackburn, to whom we must also extend our congratulations for his splendid ride of 5 hrs. 11 mins. 37 secs., which included the changing of a tyre and the loss of time entailed undoubtedly lost him first place in the Handicap. In the Speedwell "100" we were represented by W. E. L. Cooper and C. Randall, but the latter decided to stand down while Cooper took it more as a training spin for the 12 hours, his time being 5 hrs. 51 mins, 56 secs. In the North Road Invitation "24," held on September 12/13th, "Ours" were W. E. L. Cooper, C. Randall and J. G. Shaw. Unfortunately the race was run under the worst possible weather conditions, all the competitors had to contend with several hours of rain, and it blew a gale from the South-West. Under these circumstances bare figures are no indication as to the merits of the rides accomplished, and we have every reason to be proud of C. Randall's 332\frac{a}{4} miles and J. G. Shaw's 322\frac{1}{4} miles. W. E. L. Cooper, who found the adverse conditions not to his liking, retired at 187 miles.

There have been three attempts upon Records this year, unfortunately none successful. G. B. Orrell and F. L. Edwards on a tandem have experienced very hard luck in weather and tyres, but have shown that on a decent day the N.R.R.A. "50" and 12 hours' Records are well within their powers. On June 28th, on a windy day and using the Club "50" course, they were travelling well when a puncture at 20 miles forced them to desist. On July 26th they made a second attempt, this time in Shropshire, riding magnificiently and having a lot of freshly tarred roads to negotiate and baulked by a flock of sheep, they had the misfortune to miss Record by only 49 seconds. Their next attempt was on the N.R.R.A. 12 Hours on August 30th. On this occasion they had to contend with persistent rain for the first six hours, nevertheless under these conditions. they were up to schedule at 125 miles, but later on they punctured twice and found themselves 30 minutes behind at 1853 miles, and feeling the effects of the chilling rain earlier in the day, decided to pack.

In conclusion, on behalf on the Racing Men and myself I wish to express our thanks to those members who, race after race, so willingly offer their services for checking, etc. It is not right that these duties should always fall on the same few; although our membership keeps increasing, I do not find it any easier to make the necessary arrangements for the carrying out of our Racing Programme. Particulars of the races for 1925 will be in an early Circular; it should be a simple matter for all to book the dates in their diaries and to see if they cannot be a little more generous with offers of assistance than they have been in the past.

The Hon. Racing Secretary having read his Report for the past year, H. Roskell moved, and H. M. Horrocks seconded, and it was resolved—

"That the Report of the Hon. Racing Secretary be adopted, and that the best thanks of the meeting be accorded him for his services to the Club during the year."

The Hon. Treasurer having read his Report for the past year, A. T. Simpson moved, and R. Rothwell seconded, and it was resolved—

"That the accounts for the year ending December 31st, 1924, be adopted, and that the best thanks of the nieeting be given to R. Leigh Knipe and to the Auditors."

R. Leigh Knipe moved, and C. J. Conway seconded, and it was resolved

"That the Subscriptions for Active Members during 1925 shall be Twenty-five shillings, with an Entrance free of Five Shillings and that the Subscription for Honorary Members be a minimum of Ten Shillings. That the Subscriptions for Junior Members shall be:—For those under 18 years of age, 5/- per annum; and for those between 18 and 21 years of age, 15/- per annum; together with the Entrance Fee of 5/- in all cases, and that a Prize Fund be continued."

E. J. Cody and S. J. Buck were appointed Scrutineers.

W. P. Cook, proposed by C. H. Turnor, and seconded by G. B. Mercer was re-elected President.

W. T. Venables, proposed by W. H. Kettle, and carried with acclamation, was re-elected a Vice-President.

- E. Buckley, proposed by R. J. Austin, seconded by W. Orrell, was elected a Vice-President.
- W. H. Kettle, proposed by J. A. Grimshaw, and carried with acclamation, was re-elected Captain and Hon. Racing Secretary.
- S. T. Threlfall, proposed by H. Austin, seconded by F. L. Edwards, was elected a Sub-Captain.
- J. E. Rawlinson, proposed by A. E. Morton, seconded by J. Cranshaw, was re-elected a Sub-Captain.
- R. Leigh Knipe, proposed by the President, and seconded by C. J. Conway, was re-elected Hon. Treasurer.
- H. Austin, proposed by W. E. Cotter, seconded by R. J. Austin, was re-elected Hon. General Secretary.

It was resolved by ballot that the following gentlemen be elected Members of the Committee: R. J. Austin, W. E. L. Cooper, E. Edwards, G. F. Hawkes, H. M. Horrocks, J. Kinder, F. D. McCann, W. E. Taylor, C. H. Turnor and N. Turvey.

- E. O. Morris and W. E. Cotter, proposed by W. R. Toft and seconded by E. Edwards, were elected to audit the Accounts of the Club for the year ending 31st December, 1925.
- W. H. Kettle proposed, and W. E. Taylor seconded, and it was resorved-
- "That the Club's Racing Programme for 1925 consist of The Invitation "100," a Club "100," a 12 Hours Handicap, an Invitation "24," and three 50 miles' races.

The President proposed, and C. H. Turnor seconded, and it was resolved—

That a Special Prize, value Five Guineas, in lieu of the usual Gold Medal, be offered to any first-claim member who succeeds in beating any of the Unpaced Place to Place Records recognised by the Road Records Association, and not made and held by a first-claim member (or members) of the Anfield Bicycle Club. Tandem Riders to divide the Prize, as per Rule 6." C. J. Conway proposed, and W. T. Venables seconded and it was resolved—

"That the Club Tour at Easter be to Bettws-y-Coed."

N. Turvey proposed, and W. E. Taylor seconded, and it was resolved—

"That the question of holding, and the destination of an All Night Ride be left to the Committee, with a suggestion of either Wensleydale or Derbyshire."

E. Buckley proposed, and J. Kinder seconded, and it was resolved—

"That the August Tour be in the Cotswold Country."
The President proposed, and, with acclamation, it was RESOLVED—

"That a Special Vote of Thanks be accorded to A. T. Simpson for the remarkably successful way in which he has edited and for his trouble and care in connection with the 'Circular' during the past year, the 'Circular' having been a great success."

The President reported that R. A. Fulton's offer of Special Prizes, value Eight Guineas, was still open.

The meeting closed with hearty votes of thanks to the Chairman, Hon. Treasurer, Auditors, Scrutineers, Hon. General Secretary and Hon. Racing Secretary,

RULES.

- 1.—The Club shall be called the "ANFILLD BICYCLE CLUB."
- The Club shall consist of Cyclists who are considered eligible for membership under Rule 19.

Officers.

3.—The Officers of the Club shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Captain, two Sub-Captains, Honorary Secretary or Secretaries, and Treasurer, all being Active Members.

Committee.

4.—The Committee stall consist of eighteen Members including the Officers.

Audtors.

5.—Two Auditors from amongst the Members, none of the Committee being eligible, shall be appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting, to examine, and report upon, the Accounts and Balance Sheet.

Meetings.

- 6.—The Annual General Meeting shall be held within the first two weeks of January, to receive the Hon. Secretary's Report and Treasurer's Balance-Sheet; to appoint Officers and Committee for the ensuing twelve months; and to transact any other business that may be found necessary.
- 7.—A General Meeting of the Club shall take place whenever the Committee or Secretary convenes the same. Thirteen to form a quorum.
- 8.—It shall be the duty of the Committee or Secretary to convene a General Meeting when requested to do so, in

writing, by ten or more Members of the Club, and they shall call such meeting within two weeks after receiving such requisition. If the Committee or Secretary fails to call such meeting, then the requisitionists shall be entitled to call it, but no such General Meeting shall be called by the requisitionists to discuss any matter voted upon at a General Meeting within the previous twelve months.

- 9.—Six days notice of all General Meetings shall be given by the Hon. Secretary, who shall at the same time circulate amongst the Members an Agenda paper of the matters to be brought forward.
- 10.—Any member wishing to bring forward any matters shall send particulars to the Hon. Secretary, who shall cause the same to be entered on the Agenda of the next General Meeting.
- 11.—Business which does not appear on the Agenda paper shall not be brought forward until all the subjects on the Agenda have been disposed of, nor shall such business then be discussed unless it be voted tracket by two-thirds of the Members present.
- 12.—Any proposition appearing on the Agenda paper in the name of an absent member shall be deemed equal to, and treated as, a proposition made "in propria persona" by the said Member, and shall be moved by the Hon. Secretary.
- 13.—Every Amendment and every proposition which does not appear on the Agenda paper shall be written and signed by its proposer and seconder, on a form which shall be provided by the Hon. Secretary.
- 14.—No Resolution of any previous General Meeting shall be rescinded unless the Member proposing to cancel such resolution shall have given notice on the Agenda paper of his intention to do so.
- 15.—No alteration of the Rules of the Club shall be made except at a General Meeting, and then only by a two-thirds majority of the Members present and voting.

16.-No Proxy Voting shall be allowed.

17.—The Minutes of all Meetings shall be open for inspection to any Member of the Club on giving reasonable notice to the Hon. Secretary.

18.—Committee Meetings shall take place each month, preferably during the second week. Seven to form a quorum.

Active Membership.

19.—Any cyclist shall be eligible for Active Membership who is not a member of another cycling club (Cyclists' Touring Club excepted), having its headquarters within a radius of thirty miles of Liverpool or Manchester, but nothing in this rule shall affect the status of cyclists who were already members of the Anfield Bicycle Club at December 31st, 1923. Candidates for Membership must fill up a form provided by the Club, which must also be signed by the proposer and seconder (both having been Active Members of the Club for at least two years), and forward the same to the Hon. Secretary, accompanied by the Entrance Fee as per Rule Each candidate's name, together with the names 25. of his proposer and seconder, must appear in the next Monthly Circular issued after the candidate's nomination has been received, after which the nomination shall come up for consideration at the next Committee Meeting. If any objections are received, the Committee shall consider them on their merits, two negative votes to exclude; but if the nomination be still insisted on by the proposers, a Special General Meeting shall be called to consider the candidature, ten black balls to exclude.

20. Any Member violating the rules or regulations of the Club, or being discovered not to be, or ceasing to be an amateur, or acting in a manner derogatory to the interests of the Club, may be expelled by the votes of a two-thirds majority of the Members present, and voting, at a Special General Meeting summoned for the purpose, and such Member shall receive six days notice of such Meeting. Any

Member so expelled shall forfeit all claim upon the property of the Club, and shall cease to be a Member. Voting to be by ballot.

Life Membership.

21.—A General Meeting of the Members may, for eminent services rendered the Club, elect to Life Membership any Member of 15 years standing; such Life Member shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of Active Membership.

Any Member on completing One Thousand Runs shall be entitled to Life Membership, subject to confirmation by the next Annual General Meeting.

Honorary Membership.

- 22.—Candidates for Honorary Membership shall be proposed and seconded by Active Members, and shall, unless objected to, be elected by the Committee at their next meeting; but should any objection be made, it shall be dealt with under Rule 19. A General Meeting of the Members may, for service rendered the Club, place upon the Honorary Membership List the name of any Member of three years standing who shall be leaving the country. Such name to remain there during the term of his residence abroad, free from any Annual Subscription. Such a Member may on his return resume Active Membership upon his notifying the Secretary of his intention so to do, without undergoing the formality of re-election.
- 23.—Honorary Members shall not receive the regular notices of Club runs, etc., nor shall they be permitted to attend or vote at any General Meetings, nor to take part in more than three Club runs during the year, nor to compete for any of the long-distance prizes or in any of the closed events.
- 24.—An Honorary Member may become an Active Member upon payment of the difference between his honorary subscription and the current subscription and Entrance Fee of the Club; but his name must come before the Committee in the usual way.

Subscriptions, &e

25.—The MINIMUM Annual Subscription for Honorary Members shall be 10/-, no entrance fee being charged to them. The Annual Subscription for Active Members shall be Twenty-five Shillings, payable within one month from date of election with an Entrance Fee of 5/-. The Annual Subscription for Junior Active Members shall be-for those under 18 years of age 5/-, and for those between 18 and 21 years of age 15/-, together with the Entrance Fee of 5/- in each case. Any Member whose Renewal Subscription is not paid by 1st March shall receive written application from the Treasurer, and if payment be not made within one month from the date of such notice, the Treasurer shall bring the matter before the Committee, that body having full power to deal with the case as it thinks fit. After the 31st August in each year, the subscription to incoming Members shall be one-half the ordinary Annual Subscription. but after the 31st October in each year the full Annual Subscription paid by such Members shall provide Membership to the 31st December in the following year, the full Entrance Fee shall be chargeable under all circumstances.

Resignations &c.

26.—Any Officer or Member of the Committee wishing to resign his office or seat on the Committee, shall notify the same (in writing) to the Hon. Secretary, for the information of the Committee, but until such resignation shall have been accepted, he shall continue to exercise the duties and retain the responsibilities of his office.

27.—Any Active Member wishing to resign must give notice (in writing) to the Hon. Secretary, before the Annual General Meeting; otherwise he will be held accountable for the ensuing year's subscription.

Finance.

28.—The funds of the Club shall be banked in the name of the Anfield Bicycle Club: the President and Treasurer for the time being shall jointly sign cheques to meet current expenditure, as authorised by the Committee. All accounts to be passed by the Committee and initialled by the Chairman before payment.

29.—The Financial Year of the Club shall expire on the 31st December in each year.

Club Colours.

30.—The Club Colours shall be Blue and Black. The Badge shall be a Silver Button enamelled with the Club Colours; Record Breakers' Badges shall be distinguished by a Beaded Edge. The Badges shall remain the property of the Club, and upon the expiration of Membership, if called for, shall be returned to the Hon. Secretary, who will allow for same. The Captain shall wear a Gold Monogram Cap Dalge.

Committee.

- 31.—All runs shall be arranged by the Committee, and shall not be altered without its consent.
- 32.—The Committee shall have power to fill up any vacancy in the Officers or Committee which shall occur within the year, subject to confirmation by the next General Meeting.
- 33.—The Committee may decide any question on the meaning of these Rules, or anything relative to the Club not provided for therein, and may do whatever they deem necessary for the well-being of the Club, which is not inconsistent with these Rules. The decision of the Committee shall be final, unless notice of appeal (in writing) be given to the Hon. Secretary within seven days following that on which the decision is arrived at. All such appeals shall be heard at the next General Meeting, and the decision of such Meeting shall, in every case, be final.

A Special Prize value Five Guineas in lieu of the usual Gold Medal will be awarded to any first-claim Member who succeeds in beating any of the Unpaced Place to Place Records recognised by the Road Records Association, and not made and held by a first-claim Member (or Members) of the Anfield Bicycle Club. Tandem riders to divide the Prize as per Rule 6.

A Member who succeeds in beating a Record more than once shall be entitled to a Medal for the highest performance only at each distance during the year. This Rule does not apply to the Special Place to Place Record Prizes.

No. 7.—If a Record Medal is awarded, no Standard Medal can be claimed for the same performance. No 50 or 100 miles Standard Medals will be given in any 12 or 24 Hours Race or Ride. No Standard Medals can be claimed for any distance in Place to Place Record rides. Gold Medal, from Club Die, will only be awarded for Records, Fastest Times, First Prizes, and for Standard D and upwards, as per Rule No. 2.

No. 8.—Members winning Medals may substitute Prizes of equal value, subject to the approval of the Committee as to the form these may take.

No. 9.—Claims for Medals, accompanied by proofs, must be sent in to the Hon. Racing Secretary within 7 days after the performance of each ride.

No. 10.—No distance ridden in any of the Competitions will be recognised if it be done either wholly or partially on a Sunday, and ne Member shall be permitted to ride in any of the Club races or time trials who has taken part in any race or time trial held on Sundays, subsequent to his election.

No. 11.—No piece of Road May, upon any pretext, be covered more than twice, or if covered, shall not be counted in the total distance claimed.

No. 12.—Motor pacing or following is entirely barred. In attempts for impaced Standard Medals, followers are not allowed to approach the rider within 100 yards.

No. 13. All Prizes and Medals will be awarded at the discretion of the Committee, who shall have full power to decide any question which may arise as to the interpretation or application of the rules.
